Kit was born and raised in North Vancouver where he spent much of his upbringing playing hockey, skiing and sea kayaking. He got his Bachelors of Arts (1996) and his Bachelors of Education (1999) degrees from University of British Columbia, and obtained his law degree from the University of Calgary, in 2003, but also studied international and maritime law abroad at the University of Oslo, in Norway. He still teaches on occasion in the public schools, mostly for North Vancouver School District #44.

Prior to his call to the Bar of British Columbia in 2004, and his call to the Bar in Manitoba, in 2005, he was a secondary school teacher. In the past 18 years, he has practiced in civil litigation, mainly Aboriginal law and civil rights cases, but also in personal injury and family law.
